Andrew Jamieson's Gift

Andrew Jamieson, who was awarded the "Lifetime Achievement Award" at our March Annual Dinner, very kindly made a substantial donation via the FP Club, for use by the school for the benefit of current pupils. The school has put forward a list of four proposals, an Allotment Project leading to John Muir Awards, Outdoor Learning Experience, Social Skills Course for vulnerable pupils and a Lunchtime Board Games Class to encourage thinking skills related to numeracy and literacy. The FP committee has agreed the proposals. Our thanks once again to Dr Jamieson for his donation.

Committee News:

The committee is actively pursuing opportunities to allow us to work more closely with the school where we can help senior students preparing for the transition from school to tertiary education or the workplace. We propose that FP's would give a series of short talks on their own careers, preparing for university, interview guidance, etc.

Our work to establish a "Whitehill FP Website" is progressing and it is expected that it will be fully operational by year end.

Obituary:

We thought it appropriate in this year when we are commemorating 100 years since the start of WW1 and the 70th anniversary of D-Day, to remember a distinguished former pupil, who served in WW2.

Harry McKendrick who has died aged 91, had the key role of navigator on Lancaster bombers in the RAF's famous Bomber Command during the Second World War. By the end of the war he had spent 359 hours on daylight missions and had amassed 207 hours in the pitch black of night, lit up only by ack-ack fire. He had attended Whitehill School, in the same period as Rikki Fulton and signed up for the RAF as soon as he turned 18 in July 1940. In the final days of the war his squadron took part in Operation Manna, dropping thousands of tons of badly needed food supplies to starving Dutch people in The Hague. The boy from Riddrie was proud of dropping food instead of bombs. After war's end, he took part in Operation Exodus, flying home grateful airmen and soldiers and Royal Navy personnel who had been liberated from POW camps.

Harry went on to Jordanhill and became a teacher. He taught at several Glasgow schools and retired in 1982 as the much loved headteacher at Carntyne Primary. One of his teaching aims was to educate children that "peace was always a better alternative to war". (Summarised from the obituary published in The Herald, Phil Davison, March 2014)
