STAFF: We note with regret that the rate of turnover still remains at a level too high for the efficient functioning of Education.

English: Mr. McIntosh returned to Dundee and was replaced by Miss Carswell, who has also taken over the School Library. 



The Six-One Club

Whitehill demands a ludicrous, sentimental attachment, a sort of inverted snobbery, which in later life finds me arrogantly proclaiming the values of an East End education to a Cambridge graduate who is regretting wasting his years at an all-boys boarding school. I can think of no better argument for co-education than my own experience at Whitehill!

To perpetuate some of the myths which surround the good name of Whitehill, a dinner club was formed seven years ago. It took as its name Six-One and consisted of all the members of that form class in 1965-66.

We had little right to take that name for ourselves since we excluded members of that form class in the future, even though some of our members threatened to spend their adult lives entrenched in the class. Neither did we allow women within our ranks, the agreed reason being that they weren't members of Six-One but of Six-Two.

Germaine Greer would never have let us off with it but the germane girls of Six-Two seemed glad to be rid off us. We have as yet had to repulse no attacks on this fortress of male domination.

The club meet once a year, always the last Saturday in February, in a hotel in the greater Glasgow area. Because of our reputation we find it necessary not to have a fixed station. I suppose the club will last as long as a hotel in the catchment area hasn't heard of us.

Contrary to opinion, there is nothing sinister or cladestine about our operations. Our elected head is James Macaulay, a former history teacher at the school and a battle-hardened veteran who was given charge of the embryonic Six-One when we were Four-One.

In fact, what the Establishment regard as sinister is the way Whitehill is infiltrating the power set-up in Britain. From this mass of lumpen proleteriat have evolved men and women who hold positions of authority.

Within Six-One alone we have a hold on religion, law, science, money (admittedly tenuous) and the media. Whitehill has acquired a reputation in recent years for discovering journalists.

Whitehill was quick to make a lasting impression on me. It happened that on the first day of my first term Sinclair Ferguson rescued me from an uneven altercation with the angular Martin Chambers, your narrator being so small that he was quickly labelled "Giant".

Both are members now of Six-One, Sinclair being a minister and Martin attached to a legal firm. His firm must for reasons of libel remain unknown but whose names are parodied as Delay, Worry and Expense. The moral which I was quick to realise was that divine law is more powerful than secular justice and that in the end lawyers must answer to God also.

Sinclair has the capacity to become Whitehill's first Moderator of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland (Assembly Committee '93 take note!)

Lasting impressions were easily formed in school days as many of the members of Six-One quickly found. A certain geography teacher kept what was euphemistically known as a "late" book. The names therein — and they included Andy Jamieson, a former captain of the Scottish Universities football team who works now in Wales, Ronnie Brown, engaged in work at Dounreay, and your narrator — were a guide to how corporal punishment was meted out.

Three "cautions" brought down the wrath of this giant of a man. He administered the belt with an almost surrealistic flair for terror. The tawse would emerge from a cardboard map-holder or from within the sleeve of his jacket and it stung with an acerbic

Andy Jamieson survived the experience to become the only Six-One pupil member to take a doctorate, in

chemistry at Glasgow University. In fact, he beat our president, James Macaulay, to the honour by a few months. For Mr. Macaulay it was the culmination of seven years work which dragged from him 200,000 words in two volumes with 3000 footnotes.

Such is the comradeship of Six-One that members are prepared to travel from all points in Britain. At the most recent gathering were Willie McLeod from Cornwall, Albert Henderson and Andy Jamieson from Wales, and Ronnie Brown from Dounreay.

The numbers, which in the early days were 38, have settled to 25 or 26. Perhaps the most notable absentees are Hugh Tees, a former school captain now in Toronto, Jim Black who always attended while at Newcastle University but now that he is back home has deserted the cause, and Abe Acheson, The latter hasn't actually attended a dinner but is remembered fondly as going to trace Andrew Carnegie's footsteps in Fife. So far, we believe, he hasn't made his first million.
