He now lives on Vancouver Island, Canada.

I earned a Ph.D. in Genetics and worked professionally in Canada, USA and, in my own company, with others across the world.

2) Stephen Scobie



Stephen Scobie left Whitehill in 1960 after 6th year. He won the Classics Medal in 1960 and unsurprisingly given his career, the English prize. Stephen is a critic and a poet who won the Governor General's Award for Poetry in 1980 and the Prix Gabrielle Roy for Canadian Criticism in 1986. A founding editor of Longspoon Press, his literary criticism includes books on Leonard Cohen, Sheila Watson and Bob Dylan.

His first book of poetry, *Stone Poems*, was published by Talonbooks in 1974. His critical work, *What History Teaches*, published in 1984, is part of the Talonbooks New Canadian Criticism Series edited by Frank Davey. Scobie was born in Carnoustie, Scotland in 1943 and went to Canada in 1965. He earned a PhD from the University of British Columbia in Vancouver after which he taught at the University of Alberta and at the University of Victoria, from which he recently retired. Formerly based in the Prairies, he now lives in Victoria, B.C.

3) Continental Holiday, July 1964: Iain McLean.



In July 1964, I and about 30 other Whitehill Pupils went on the Whitehill School annual continental holiday organised by Miss Hutcheson. In previous years the destination had been Viareggio in Italy but in 1964 she upped her game and the holiday was a cruise on the TSS Fantasia, from Venice to Athens, the Greek Islands, Israel and Yugoslavia.

The journey from Glasgow to Venice was an adventure in itself; 2 full days by train and Channel ferry. We had a coach tour of London on the way and visited St Paul's Cathedral and The Tower of London. The train ride over the Alps was amazing.

In Venice we stayed 2 nights in a Youth Hostel run by nuns. A bit of a culture shock for non-Catholics from Glasgow. The accommodation was very comfortable and we were made most welcome.

On the cruise our first port of call was Piraeus for Athens. It was fascinating to visit the Acropolis and the Parthenon which is on everyone's bucket list. However, as we visited the Greek Islands of Crete, Rhodes, Mykonos and Corfu it became clear to us that Miss Hutcheson's enthusiasm for visiting ancient ruins under the boiling hot sun knew no bounds. Most of us would have preferred to head straight for the beach or have fun around the ship's pool.

Israel was very interesting. We visited Haifa, Tel Aviv, Jerusalem and Nazareth. At that time most of the old religious sites were controlled by Jordan and we were unable to visit them. Miss Hutcheson was disappointed but most of us were ok with it.

According to my diary which we were encouraged, i.e. forced, to write up each day, there was a fancy dress party one evening on the ship and three of our group won a prize. I don't remember who they were, maybe someone reading this does.

The holiday was a great experience. We had a lot of fun in the group and we saw enough ancient ruins to last a lifetime. (Sorry Miss H!) All of this for the princely sum of approximately £65.00, which equates to around £1200 today. Good value for a three week trip.

I've included a scan of the information sheet handed out by Miss Hutcheson before the trip and additional photographs that can be viewed in the web version of the newsletter. It makes for fascinating reading, e.g. only 2 changes of underwear allowed for 3 weeks in the Mediterranean in July.

Essential Passport or Identity Card. 2. Diary.

Biscuits, Ryvita Crispbread, etc. Wrapped Malted Loaf. Provisions Tin (screw top lid) of Jam; a tube of Jam or Cheese. Sweets - (Wrapped boilings) - Tablet.

Avoid Chocolate, Butter - these melt.
Fruit - (Refreshing e.g. Oranges, Apples, Bananas)
1 Bottle Lemonade, etc. Keep the bottle; it is useful

for refilling at stations en route.

Tin of Creamola Foam, etc.

Toilet Comb, toothbrush, toothpaste. Health Salts.

Face-cloth for travelling. Soap - 2 cakes.
Calamine Lotion or Sun-tan Lotion. Share these.

All other Medical Equipment will be supplied.

Keep to a minimum. YOU HAVE TO CARRY IT. Clothing Luggage must be light.

Paper handkerchiefs, 3 pairs socks, 2 changes of under-

clothing, 2 towels.

Comfortable Shoes (NOT NEW). Sandshoes.

Shorts for Cruising.

Thread, needles, buttons, darning materials.

Coat-hangers, Cleaning materials for shoes - SHARE THESE

IMPORTANT No valuable jewellery, valuable cameras or watches.

CORRESPONDENCE

- (a) Have ready and handy a plain postcard stamped (2½d.) and addressed to your parent with an "arrived safely" message to be sent from London.
- (b) Postcards and letters will be sent from the various places to be visited.

DISCIPLINE

The Group comes first. Your wishes next. Pay attention to all instructions while travelling. All regulations regarding Lights-Out, Sun-bathing, Sea-bathing, Dress, etc., must be adhered to. No short sleeves on the first day.

Note N.B.

Swimming. Whenever possible there will be bathing. No bathing, however, without supervision. Strict obedience to regulations is essential.
