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PROSPECTUS

FOR SESSION, 1903-4.

WHITEHILL SCHOOL was opened on the 16th November, 1892, as a School for both boys and girls, and it is now organised and conducted as a Secondary School. It is recognised by the Glasgow Burgh Committee as the Secondary School for the Dennistoun District, and is registered by the Scotch Education Department as a "Higher Grade School."

The pupils of the highest classes have so increased in number that the School Board have considered it necessary to discontinue the Infant Department and Classes I. and II., so that the lowest Class of the School now is what was formerly Class III.

In the Primary Department, including Classes III., IV., V., and VI., the pupils are carried forward until they are over 12 years of age, and are able to pass an examination qualifying them for enrolment in the Higher Grade Department. In this Higher Division they enter upon a course of education, which may extend over five years, to prepare themselves for directly entering the University or the Training College, or for some of the higher situations in commercial, industrial, or Civil Service life.

The Classes of the Higher Grade School are so arranged that pupils may take any one of the following Courses:—(1) A Classical or University Course, giving prominence to the study of Latin, Greek, Mathematics, and Science; (2) A Modern or Commercial Course, in which French or German may take the place of Greek,

and in which Shorthand, Book keeping, and Commercial Arithmetic are introduced; (3) A special Course for girls, in which Cookery, Laundry, Dressmaking and Sick Nursing are substituted for the Mathematics and German of the 2nd Course; and (4) An Art Course, including all the subjects taught in the Art School. For each of these Courses a curriculum of five years has been arranged, the classes beyond the third year depending on a sufficient number of pupils coming forward.

As will be seen from the list of University prizes and honours, the University students who were recently pupils of this School are doing credit to themselves and to their previous training. All are worthy of praise; but this year may be specially mentioned Mr John C. Rollo, who was first in order of merit at the Bursary Examination last October, and who at the end of his first Session carried off the First Prize (the Cowan Gold Medal) in Latin, and the First Prize (the Jeffrey Gold Medal) in Greek; and Mr John M'Whan who passed third at the Bursary Examination.

It may be mentioned here that the National Bronze Medal for a design for a carpet has been awarded to Miss Mary Jane Armour, a pupil of the Evening Continuation Art Classes.

The Whitehill School Club are thanked very kindly for their gift of £2 for the purchase of books for the Dux boy and the Dux girl of the School. The recipients last year were Mr John C. Rollo and Miss Margaret Wood. Intimation has been received of a repetition of the gift this year.

CURRICULUM OF THE HIGHER GRADE SCHOOL.

ENGLISH.

FIRST YEAR.—Grammar; Composition; Paraphrasing; Study of Selections from easy English Classics and of the Lives of the Authors; Geography of the British Isles and the Colonies; Period of English History.

SECOND YEAR.—Composition; Paraphrasing; Play of Shakespeare; Outlines of the History of English Literature and of the History of the Language; Geography of the Colonies and of Europe; Period of English History.

THIRD YEAR.—Composition; Paraphrasing; Play of Shakespeare; History of English Language and Literature; Geography of Asia and America, and revision of work of previous years Period of English History.

FOURTH YEAR.—More extended study of English Literature, with special attention to the more difficult works prescribed for the University Preliminary Examination; Chaucer; Geography of the World; Constitutional History.

LATIN.

FIRST YEAR.—Grammar; Composition Exercises; Cæsar.

SECOND YEAR.—Grammar; Composition; Cæsar and Ovid.

THIRD YEAR.—Composition; Ovid, Livy, Virgil, Cicero.

FOURTH YEAR.—Advanced Composition; Livy, Cicero, Tacitus, Virgil, Horace.

GREEK.

FIRST YEAR.—Grammar; Xenophon or easy selections.

SECOND YEAR.—Grammar: Composition; Xenophon, Lucian.

THIRD YEAR.—Lucian, Homer, Euripides; Greek Composition.

FOURTH YEAR.—Plato, Demosthenes, Homer, Sophocles; Greek Composition.

FOURTH YEAR.—Third year's work more advanced.

SECOND YEAR.—Grammar Continued; Translation and Retranslation; Composition; Conversation; Outlines of Literature.

THIRD YEAR.—Grammar and Syntax; Idioms; Composition; Study of Modern Authors; History of Literature; Commercial Correspondence; Conversation.

FOURTH YEAR.—Continuance of third year, more advanced; Comparative Philology.

- FIRST YEAR.—(1) Theoretical Chemistry—General principles of the Science ; Experimental demonstrations of general laws ; Study of most important non-metallic elements, with experimental illustrations.
- (2) Practical Chemistry—Preparation of the most important gases, with experimental testing of properties ; Carrying out of experiments according to instructions ; Quantitative experiments of a simple kind.
- (3) Hygiene—Elementary Stage.

SECOND YEAR.—(1) Theoretical and Practical Chemistry—Advanced stage, embracing, in Theory, the study of all the commonly occurring metals and non-metals and their various compounds; and, in Practice, testing for the whole of the metals and acids, except those of rare occurrence; Simple volumetric analysis.

(2) Hygiene—Advanced stage.

THIRD AND FOURTH YEARS.—

(1) Dynamics of Solids and Fluids.

(2) Physiography.

DRAWING.

Drawing is taught to every pupil of the School. As the Classes of this School are established as an "Art School," and as Mr Donnan the Teacher of Drawing, besides being an Art Master, is an experienced Artist, special encouragement and facilities are given to Pupils who wish to devote their time to the advanced work of the Art Course. The following is the Higher Grade School Course:—

FIRST YEAR.—Freehand, with Construction and Ornament; Model Drawing; Geometrical Drawing.

SECOND YEAR.—Freehand and Model Drawing; Drawing and Colouring from Natural Objects, and their application to simple designs; Geometrical Drawing.

THIRD YEAR.—Drawing in Outline from Casts of Ornament; Application of Natural Objects (Butterflies, Shells, etc.) to Design continued.

FOURTH YEAR.—Shading from Casts of Ornament: Study of Natural Objects (Flowers, Birds, Animals, etc.) and their application to Design continued.

NATURE STUDY.

Elementary Lessons in Science are given to the whole School, beginning at the very youngest children, to whom instruction is imparted in the form of Objects Lessons describing and explaining the more common objects connected with their every day Life, and training their senses to the proper perception of colour, form, distance, size, and weight. To the older children the lessons give general notions of the difference of structure of beast, bird, fish, insect, and reptile; the general structure of the human body; the laws of health; the structure of plants and the functions of their different parts; the properties of matter; the preparation of gases; and some of the ordinary phenomena of electricity. The aim of this teaching is—(1) The cultivation of the perceptive faculty; (2) The communication of useful knowledge; and (3) The development of the powers of generalisation and inductive reasoning

SHORTHAND.

Pitman's System of Shorthand is taught to all those who take the Commercial Course of study. Pitman's Primers are in use as text books; and Æsop's Fables (in Shorthand) and the "Phonetic Journal" are used for practice in reading. In the reporting stage attention is given to business phrases, and a speed of 90 words per minute has been attained.

BOOK-KEEPING.

The principles of Book-keeping are explained, and the Pupils are exercised in the use of the Invoice Book, Day Book, Cash Books and Journal, in posting from the subsidiary books to the Ledger, and in Balancing. The various banking transactions connected with cash, cheques, bills, and bills of lading are explained. The broad principles underlying all systems of Book-keeping are made clear, so that the Pupils may easily adapt themselves to whatever system they may be called upon to use.

Mr Martin, the Teacher of this subject, is specially qualified, as he has had practical experience of commercial life.

SINGING.

Singing is taught to the whole School from notes on the Sol-fa system, and also in the Old Notation to the advanced Scholars.

PIANOFORTE.

Lessons on the Pianoforte are given to all that desire them, and every encouragement is given to advanced pupils and those desirous of studying classical music, or who wish to obtain the advanced certificates of the colleges of music.

The Pianoforte Classes have now been put in connection with the Associated Board of the Royal Academy of Music and the Royal College of Music, London; and the Pupils of this School have the privilege of being examined by that Association.

PHYSICAL EXERCISE AND MANUAL TRAINING.

The Gymnasium and the Manual Workshop are in constant use. They are each among the largest and the best equipped of the kind in the country.

The Gymnasium is completely fitted up with all the different kinds of apparatus necessary for the teaching of Physical Exercises; and all the Pupils of the School, both boys and girls, above the Third Class are trained in their proper use. The younger pupils receive regular training in the more simple exercises.

The Manual Workshop is fitted up with 54 benches, each provided with a complete set of tools. The object aimed at in this work is not the teaching of a trade, but the training of the hand and eye and the developing of confidence and efficient skill in the use of tools. The woodwork is taught in connection with drawing, the pupils being taught to make articles in wood from sketches which they themselves have previously drawn to scale on paper.

ELOCUTION.

Elocution is taught by Mr John Forsyth, Teacher of Elocution in the University of Glasgow. Mr Forsyth's work is not confined to the highest classes; but all the children of the School who are able to read fairly fluently receive regular and systematic instruction in this branch.

DANCING.

The Dancing Classes will be resumed next Session, of which due notice will be given.

LEAVING CERTIFICATES.

These valuable Certificates, for which the pupils of the Higher Class Schools throughout Scotland are allowed to compete, are, from the severity of the test applied and the privileges attached to their possession, prizes worth striving for. They were instituted by the Education Department of the Privy Council, and are awarded as the result of examinations held by that Department in the month of June, each year. At the examination in June, 1902, the success of the pupils of this School who were presented for examination was specially gratifying. 429 Certificates were obtained, of which 19 were of the Honours Grade. The subjects of Examination were English, Latin, Greek, French, German, Mathematics (including Arithmetic), Arithmetic alone, Dynamics, Analytical Geometry, Geometrical Conics and Book-keeping.

Leaving Certificates were granted to Christina P. Brown, John J. M'Whan, John C. Rollo, and Justina T. Weir; and Intermediate Certificates to Jessie F. Craig, Mary C. Gillies, Adam B. Mitchell, and Helen R. Walker.

SCHOLARSHIPS AND BURSARIES.

This School is one of the centres at which the Scholarships of the Burgh Committee and the Bursaries of the City and General Endowments Boards and of the Marshall Trust must be held, The Burgh Committee Scholarships, of the value of the fees of the School, and tenable for three years, are competed for by pupils who

have been for at least three years in a School within the district of the School Board of Glasgow, and who are in Class VII. at the time of the competition. The Bursaries are of two grades : (1) " School " Bursaries of the value of £5 or £10 a year, and (2) " Technical or Higher Education " Bursaries of the value of £15 a year.

Besides these there are University Bursaries of the value of £25 a year for four years, awarded by the Endowments Boards, and of the value of £30 a year for five years, by the Marshall Trust.

All particulars regarding these Bursaries and Scholarships will be given on applying to the Headmaster.
